3a A 1965 film directed by Brian Forbes, starring George Segal, Tom Courtney and James Fox **King Rat**

3b A colloquial phrase referring to a confidence trick from the late Middle Ages in which somebody buys something in a bag, "sight unseen" **Pig in a Poke**

4a The largest living species of lizard, found on various islands of Indonesia **Komodo Dragon**

4b A meander in a river that becomes increasingly curved and eventually, by erosion, detached from the river **Oxbow Lake**
