2A. Born on this day in 1931, who became the first black Archbishop of Cape Town? (Answer: **DESMOND TUTU**).

2B. Following the assassination of his predecessor, who became Prime Minister of Egypt (and subsequently President) on this day in 1981? (Answer: **HOSNI MUBARAK**).

3A. Born on this day in 1900, who was the leader of the SS (Reichsfuehrer-SS) in Nazi Germany from 1929 until 1945, and committed suicide after his capture by the British? (Answer: **HEINRICH HIMMLER**).

3B. Born on this day in 1934, which woman co-founded the German terrorist group Red Army Faction (R.A.F.) with Andreas Baader? (Answer: **ULRIKE MEINHOF**).

4A. Born on this day in 1935, who wrote the novel "Schindler's Ark"? (Answer: **THOMAS KENEALLY**).

4B. What was the name of the cruise ship hijacked in the Mediterranean on this day in 1985 by terrorists of the Palestine Liberation Front? (Answer: **ACHILLE LAURO**).
