3a. Hey diddle diddle -- **And the dish ran away with the spoon.**  
3b. It's raining and pouring -- **And he couldn't get up in the morning.**  
4a. Little Bo Peep (first verse) -- **Bringing (accept wagging) their tails behind them**  
4b. Oranges and lemons -- (and)**here comes a chopper to chop off your head**

**Spare**: This Little Piggy -- **And this little piggy went wee wee wee all the way home (accept "wee wee wee all the way home)**

3a)	Alexander Fleming discovers penicillin	--	<b>1928</b>
3b)	Charles Darwin publishes "On the Origin of Species"	--	<b>1859</b>
4a)	Albert Einstein publishes his "General Theory of Relativity"	--	<b>1915</b>
4b)	Wilhelm Rontgen discovers X rays	--	<b>1895</b>
