- **4b:** QANTAS is Australia's largest airline and it is the second oldest airline still in operation. What does the NT in its name stand for?

- **2b:** A Cornish seaside town and one of the largest fishing ports in England. The Ordnance Survey bases all elevations including mapped contour lines and spot heights on the mean sea level here. **Newlyn**

- **4a:** A standing force formed in 1645 by the Parliamentarians during the First English Civil War, then disbanded after the Restoration in 1660. Members were liable for service anywhere in the country, rather than being limited to a single area or garrison as before. **New Model Army**
- **4b:** The Grand Banks of this place are one of the world's richest fishing grounds. Also gives its name to a very large dog breed that was originally used to pull nets for fishermen there.

Newfoundland

Spare: It's one of the 13 original U.S. states, known as the Granite state. It is home to Mount Washington and its largest city is Manchester.

- **2b:** A former international professional footballer. He made 653 Premier League appearances: the highest number in the Premier League's history. (Gareth) **Barry**
- **3a:** Born in 1952, a former track and field sprinter. He won the 100 metres gold medal and 200 metres silver medal at the 1980 Summer Olympics in Moscow. (Allan) **Wells**
- **3b:** Former swimmer who won two gold medals at the 2008 Summer Olympics in the 400m and 800m freestyle events and her first World Championship gold over 800m in 2011.

 (Rebecca) **Adlington**
- **4a:** Retired long-distance runner. Multiple Marathon wins in London, New York and Chicago. Held the Women's World Marathon Record from 2003 to 2019. (Paula) **Radcliffe**
- **4b:** Born 1968, a right-handed opening batsman for Lancashire and England, and occasional legbreak bowler. Achieved the captaincy of England at the age of 25. (Michael) **Atherton**

Spare: Born in 1994, an English international professional footballer who currently plays for Chelsea and previously for Manchester City and Liverpool. (Raheem) **Sterling**
